Post-Doctoral/Post Masters Fellowship

The Boulder Institute for Psychotherapy and Research (BIPR) is now accepting applications for a Post-Doctoral and/or Post-Masters Fellow starting June 1, 2012 or July 1, 2012. The position is a 25-30 hour/week position. Students are expected to work 4-6 hours on one weekend day each week.

BIPR is a non-profit organization whose mission is to build bridges between the latest advances in the knowledge of human development and effective services that promote healthy lives and communities. The training at BIPR is rich in attachment theory, the impact of trauma on the brain, and neurobiologically informed psychodynamic psychotherapy. Clients range from very young children to adults. Couples, group and family therapy are also possible. An integral part of the program is intensive work in early childhood including: preschool and nursery school consultation, and early intervention in infant/parent, toddler/parent or preschool child/parent dyads. BIPR makes every attempt to assign cases based on student areas of interest. Research opportunities may be available.

Training includes 5-6 hours of seminars/week, 1-2 hours of individual supervision (depending on number of cases seen) and mentoring. Seminars include:

- Bridging the Gap between Neuroscience, Attachment, and Contemporary Relational Psychodynamic Theories: Expanding Techniques and Exploring the Process within the Psychotherapeutic Dyad: This is a year-long seminar, which integrates neurobiological findings and attachment theory into the practice of psychodynamic psychotherapy;
- Professional Issues Seminar/Intake and Triage Seminar: This seminar emphasizes the importance of an extensive case conceptualization phase of treatment. New cases are discussed and triaged. Clinical practice issues, especially those inherent in being a practicing psychotherapist, are discussed.
- Special Issues seminars. These are shorter seminars with an in-depth focus on particular issues. They may include:
 - The Neurobiology of Trauma and Dissociation: Implications for Treatment
 - Attachment Theory in Clinical Practice
 - The Clinical Use of Drawings in Psychotherapy
 - Child Play Therapy
 - Reflective Supervision
 - Opening a Private Practice—Clinical Considerations and Nuts and Bolts
 - Clinical Consultation in Nursery and Preschools
 - Infant Observation
